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Federal Update for Connect Transit Prepared by Cardinal Infrastructure Prepared May 18, 2022

Fiscal Year 2023 Budget/Appropriations

Appropriations hearings are ongoing in May, with the expectation that projects advanced to Committee are announced by the end of the month. If a project ends up in Committee, it has a 50/50 chance of receiving funding. House Appropriations Chair Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn.) said as she left a closed-door meeting with her counterparts, "to look to getting the top lines within the next couple of weeks." The House Appropriations Committee plans to mark up all 12 spending bills in June, with floor action likely to follow in July. The Senate spending panel has yet to map out a markup schedule.

Transportation workforce issues were front and center when Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg testified before the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee in early May.

Although the nominal subject of the hearing was the fiscal 2023 budget request for USDOT, Senators used the opportunity to ask Buttigieg about whatever they wanted to hear about. And they did – but since there were rarely more than three or four Senators in the room at any one time, the same question was asked by multiple Senators on multiple occasions.

Buttigieg made it clear that workforce issues were being heavily discussed at DOT and that his office is working to expand the available labor pool by providing training to get more truckers, pilots, and bus drivers in the pipeline.

Department of Transportation - Nominations

DOT is brimming with cash and directives for how to spend it handed out by the recent infrastructure law, even as all but two of the subagencies it directs are without a confirmed top leader. Of DOT's nine departments, seven of them are led by deputy or acting administrators and four of them are awaiting a nominee for the top job. Only the Federal Railroad Administration has both an administrator and a deputy in place.

On May 12, FTA Administrator Nuria Fernandez announced the appointment of Veronica Vanterpool as Deputy Administrator. Vanterpool has served as Senior Advisor in the FTA Office of the Administrator since August 2021. Prior to joining FTA, Vanterpool served as the first Chief Innovation Officer at Delaware Transit Corporation. Vanterpool was nominated by former NYC Mayor Bill de Blasio to the board of the New York Metropolitan Transportation Authority, where she served from 2016 to 2019 on five committees while also chairing the board's paratransit working group.

From Politico - "Sherry Little, a partner at Cardinal Infrastructure lobbying firm and a former deputy and acting FTA administrator under the second Bush administration, said having deputies in place is crucial even in normal times. But it's especially important now, when DOT is implementing "a piece of legislation that's of this magnitude, and it's such a signature piece of the president's agenda," she said."

Infrastructure Bill Implementation (SS4A and Corridor ID Programs)

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the new <u>Safe Streets and Roads for All</u> (SS4A) discretionary program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over the next 5 years. In fiscal year 2022 (FY22), up to \$1 billion is available. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries.

The BIL requires the Secretary to establish a program to facilitate the development of intercity passenger rail corridors. The Corridor ID Program establishes a comprehensive intercity passenger rail planning framework that will help guide future federal project development work and capital investments.

The Corridor ID Program itself will only encompass the pre-construction development of selected corridors – which may include planning, environmental review, preliminary engineering, and other corridor development activities. Selection of corridors into the Corridor ID Program by FRA will reflect the agency's interest in the advancement of these corridors to implementation and operation.

Ridership

According to data published in April by the FTA, transit agencies carried 53.8% as many riders in February 2022 as they did in February 2020. Measured in vehicle-revenue miles, transit agencies were able to offer 83% of pre-pandemic service. Although not as high as many in the industry would like, the numbers indicate a year-long trend (after a year of hovering around 40% between March 2020 and March 2021) of people slowly returning to work, school, and social life.

U.S. Department of Transportation Naming Bill

On May 6, 2022, President Biden signed <u>S. 400</u> into law, which designates the headquarters building of the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) located at 1200 New Jersey Avenue, SE, in Washington, DC, as the William T. Coleman, Jr. and Norman Y. Mineta Federal Building. Secretary Mineta passed on the morning of May 3, 2022. Mineta was the first Asian American Cabinet secretary and oversaw the creation of the Transportation Security Administration post 9/11. Secretary Coleman, passed in 2017, and was the fourth U.S. Secretary of Transportation and first African American to serve in the position. This outcome brings closure to what had been a prolonged stalemate between the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives over the naming designation for USDOT headquarters.

Workforce Development

House Democrats <u>proposed</u> expanding diversity recruitment efforts across the transportation workforce as the Biden administration continues to pursue outreach programs. Transportation and Infrastructure Committee Chairman Peter DeFazio (D-Ore.) insisted the enactment of the \$1 trillion Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) presented an ideal opportunity for job creation throughout various sectors.

Ukraine and COVID Relief Funding

House appropriators released a \$39.8 billion Ukraine aid bill that directs half of its largesse to the Pentagon and U.S. arms makers.

The aid package comes in at \$6.8 billion more than the \$33 billion President Joe Biden requested and would buttress Ukraine as the country settles in for what could be a drawn-out war with Russia. The military spending in it totals approximately \$20 billion.

Biden and Democratic leaders agreed this week to Republican demands to pass the bill without adding billions of dollars more that Biden wants to pay for COVID-19 vaccines, tests and therapeutics. Republicans are skeptical of spending more on coronavirus relief and, if Democrats bring a COVID-19 bill up, want a vote on Biden's plan to lift a policy that makes it easier to turn back asylum-seekers at the border because of the public health emergency.

Supply Chain

Despite challenges, there are signs of progress in the U.S. goods movement chain. U.S. ports — including the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach collectively — imported more containers than any previous January. The total number of containerships waiting for berths at U.S. ports has dropped by 35% since peaking in early February and freight railroads' weekly intermodal movements in March approached their highest levels of 2022. Goods are successfully being delivered to shelves and real retail inventories excluding autos are at their highest levels in history and 6% above pre-pandemic levels, the DOT said.

Alleged Price Gouging

Exxon Mobil and Chevron said their quarterly earnings skyrocketed because of high oil prices, just one day after congressional Democrats said they would <u>push legislation</u> to increase the Federal Trade Commission's power to investigate allegations of price gouging. Chevron's net income reached \$6.2 billion, nearly quadruple the \$1.4 billion it posted last year. The crude oil it sold in the United States went for an average of \$77 during the quarter, up from \$48 a year earlier, it said.

High fuel prices are among the domestic economic pressure points leaders in Congress and in the Biden White House are <u>responding</u> to ahead of the November midterms. Following Russia's invasion of Ukraine, several Democrats are blaming Russian President Vladimir Putin for current fuel prices.

Short Description: COMPLETE STREETS ACT

Synopsis As Introduced

Creates the Complete Streets Act. Creates the Complete Streets Advisory Board. Provides that the Governor shall appoint members representing various agencies, organizations, or interest groups to the Advisory Board. Provides that the Advisory Board, in coordination with a representative or representatives of the Department, shall prepare a report on the status of the implementation of the Complete Streets Initiative. Provides that the Advisory Board shall submit its initial report and recommendations to the Governor, the Department, and the General Assembly on or before January 1, 2023, and annually on January 1 of each subsequent year. Defines the terms "Advisory Board", "Department", "multimodal", "multimodal planning or multimodal transportation planning", and "user or users". Effective immediately.

Creates the Electric Vehicle Charging Act, which may be referred to as the Beneficial Electrification Act. Sets forth requirements for parking spaces that are electrical vehicle ready applicable to new or renovated residential or nonresidential buildings. Sets forth provisions concerning electric vehicle charging station policies for unit owners and renters. Amends the Electric Vehicle Act. Creates the Electric Vehicle Access for All Program to maximize opportunities for carbon-free transportation across the State, particularly targeting environmental justice and low-income communities and to provide grants to pilot programs with the purpose of bridging public transportation gaps between residences and employment locations. Sets forth provisions concerning administrative review and authorized expenditure of State-controlled funds to accelerate electric vehicle adoption. Amends the Public Utilities Act. Provides that no later than May 31, 2022, electric utilities serving greater than 500,000 customers in the State shall file a Beneficial Electrification Plan with the Illinois Commerce Commission. Provides for review of the plans by the Commission and establishes a system for utilities to consider specified businesses, nonprofit organizations, or worker-owned cooperatives when awarding bids. Effective immediately.

House Floor Amendment No. 1

Replaces everything after the enacting clause. Creates the Electric Vehicle Charging Act. Provides that the Act applies to new single-family homes and newly constructed or renovated multi-unit residential buildings that have parking spaces and are constructed or renovated after the effective date of the Act. Defines terms. Provides that a new single-family residence or a small multi-family residence shall have at least one electric vehicle capable parking space for each residential unit that has dedicated parking, unless any subsequently adopted building code requires additional electric vehicle capable parking spaces or installed EVSE. Includes electric vehicle parking space requirements for a new, large multi-family residential building or a large multi-family residential building being renovated by a developer converting the property to an association. Includes electric vehicle parking space requirements for affordable housing and for an existing multi-unit residential building subject to an association that undertakes renovation. Includes electric vehicle charging station policies for unit owners and for renters.

House Floor Amendment No. 2

Removes language providing that "electric vehicle" does not mean electric motorcycles. Provides that "electric vehicle" does not include electric mopeds or electric off-highway vehicles.

House Floor Amendment No. 3

Provides that a new single-family residence or small multi-family residence that qualifies as an affordable housing development shall have one EV-capable parking space for each code-required parking space if the owner is issued a building permit 24 months after the effective date of the Act. Makes a conforming change.

Provides that upon the Department's final reconciliation determination that identifies a discrepancy between the Downstate Operating Assistance Program funds paid and the percentage of the eligible operating expenses which results in a reimbursement payment due to the Department, the participant shall remit the reimbursement payment to the Department no later than 90 days after written notification. Provides that funds received by the Department from participants for reimbursement as a result of an overpayment from a prior State fiscal year shall be deposited into the Downstate Public Transportation Fund in the fiscal year in which they are received and all unspent funds shall roll to following fiscal years. Provides that upon the Department's final reconciliation determination that identifies a discrepancy between the Downstate Operating Assistance Program funds paid and the percentage of the eligible operating expenses which results in a reimbursement payment due to the participant, the Department shall remit the reimbursement payment to the participant no later than 90 days after written notifications.

SB 2983

Short Description: COVID-19 RELIGIOUS EXEMPTION

Synopsis As Introduced

Creates the COVID-19 Religious Exemption Act. Provides that it shall be unlawful for any person, public or private institution, or public official to discriminate against any person in any manner because of such person's refusal to obtain, receive, or accept a COVID-19 vaccination contrary to his or her belief. Requires all health care facilities to adopt written access to care and information protocols that are designed to ensure that belief-based objections do not cause impairment of patients' health and that explain how belief-based objections will be addressed in a timely manner to facilitate patient care. Provides that it is unlawful for any public or private employer, entity, agency, institution, official, or person to deny admission because of, to place any reference in its application form concerning, to orally question about, to impose any burdens in terms or conditions of employment on, or to otherwise discriminate against, any applicant, in terms of employment, admission to or participation in any programs for which the applicant is eligible, or to discriminate in relation thereto, in any other manner, on account of the applicant's refusal to obtain, receive, or accept a COVID-19 vaccination that is against the applicant's beliefs. Provides that it is unlawful for any public official, guardian, agency, institution, or entity to deny any form of aid, assistance, or benefits, or to condition the reception in any way of any form of aid, assistance, or benefits, or in any other manner to coerce, disqualify, or discriminate against any person, otherwise entitled to such aid, assistance, or benefits, because that person refuses to obtain, receive, or accept a COVID-19 vaccination contrary to the person's belief. Allows any person injured by any public or private person, association, agency, entity, or corporation by reason of any action prohibited by the Act to bring an action. Provides that a person who brings an action shall recover threefold the actual damages, the costs of the action, and reasonable attorney's fees, but in no case shall recovery for each violation be less than \$2,500 plus costs of the action and reasonable attorney's fees. Makes other changes. Effective immediately.

SB 3007

Short Description: SOS-DRIVERS OMNIBUS

Synopsis As Introduced

Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that the Secretary of State is authorized to suspend or revoke the driving privileges of any person without a preliminary hearing upon a showing of the person's records or other sufficient evidence that the person has committed an out-of-State offense similar to the Illinois prohibition on the unlawful use of a license, has possessed cannabis while under 21 years of age, or has provided false information about his or her age to a cannabis establishment. Provides that driver rehabilitation specialists or programs are permitted to give driving instruction without being issued a license, except when the client of the specialist or program has never held a driver's license. Changes the implementation date concerning changes to the Secretary of State's requirements regarding the posting of certain information to the Commercial Driver's License Information System from June 22, 2021 to June 23, 2025. Provides that an individual shall be disqualified from operating a commercial motor vehicle for life if that individual uses a commercial motor vehicle in the commission of a felony involving an act or practice of severe forms of human trafficking. Amends the Probate Act of 1975. Provides requirements concerning probate court notifications to the Secretary of State in limited and plenary guardianship cases.

Senate Floor Amendment No. 1

Removes language providing that: if the court makes a finding that the respondent should not hold a driver's license, the clerk of the court shall provide a copy of the written order of limited guardianship to the Secretary of State; and if the court provides the guardian with the power to determine if the respondent may hold a driver's license, upon the guardian making a determination that the respondent should not hold a driver's license, the guardian shall notify the Secretary of State. Provides instead that when a court adjudges a respondent to be a person with a disability and appoints a plenary guardian for that person or enters an order finding that the respondent should not operate a motor vehicle, the court shall direct the circuit court clerk to notify the Secretary of State's Driver Services Department, in a form and manner prescribed by the Secretary of State, and shall forward a copy of the court order to the Secretary of State's Driver Services Department no later than 7 days after the entry of the order.

SB 3626

Synopsis As Introduced

Amends the Solid Waste Site Operator Certification Law. Creates a Solid Waste Site Operator Certification. Removes provisions concerning Class "A" and Class "B" Solid Waste Site Operator Certification. Provides that the Environmental Protection Agency is authorized to approve the use of examinations conducted by third parties. Provides that the Agency shall maintain on its website

information regarding the examinations. Provides that at the time of certificate renewal, the applicant shall certify the completion of 30 hours of continuing education covering the operation of landfills during the preceding 3 years. Provides that the fee for the issuance or renewal of a Solid Waste Site Operator Certificate shall be \$1,000. Provides that if the fee for renewal is not paid within the grace period, the fee for renewal shall be increased by \$100 (rather than \$50). Makes other changes.

Senate Floor Amendment No. 3

Replaces everything after the enacting clause with the provisions of the introduced bill and makes the following changes. Provides that a landfill site that accepts non-hazardous solid waste shall have a Solid Waste Site Operator Certification (rather than a Class A or a Class B Solid Waste Site Operator Certification). Provides that a landfill site which accepts special waste shall have a Solid Waste Site Operator certified by the Environmental Protection Agency. Provides that solid waste site operators shall be certified based on level of competency determined by examination and in accordance with educational and experience level as follows: (1) graduation from high school or equivalent and not less than 2 years (rather than 6 months) of acceptable study, training, and responsible experience in sanitary landfill operation or management, or not less than 7 (rather than 3) years of acceptable study training and responsible experience in operation or management of earth moving equipment; or (2) grammar school completion or equivalent and not less than 15 (rather than 5) years of acceptable study, training, and responsible experience in sanitary landfill operation or management. Provides that at the time of certificate renewal the applicant shall certify the completion of 15 (rather than 30) hours of continuing education covering the operation of landfills during the preceding 3 years. Provides that continuing education used to satisfy continuing education requirements must be approved by the Agency and must cover the design, operation, and maintenance of sanitary landfills, and for certificates that include a special waste endorsement, continuing education must cover the operation of landfills relative to the acceptance and disposal of special wastes. Provides that the fee for a Solid Waste Site Operator Certificate shall be \$400 (rather than \$1,000) and provides that the fee for an issuance or renewal for special waste endorsements shall be \$100.

House Committee Amendment No. 1

Replaces everything after the enacting clause with the provisions of the engrossed bill, and makes the following changes: Amends the Illinois Oil and Gas Act. Defines "temporary abandonment status". Provides that before engaging in the business of removing liquid oil field waste from an on-site collection point, the person shall apply for a permit with a fee of \$150 (instead of \$100). Provides that each application to transport oil field waste shall be accompanied by a biennial permit fee of \$150 (instead of \$100) for each vehicle sought to be licensed. Provides the requirements for application for temporary abandonment status. Provides the requirements for a permittee to conduct a fluid level test upon the fluid in the well bore. Provides the fees that the Department of Natural Resources shall assess for each well in temporary abandonment status. Provides that each application for a permit to drill, deepen, convert, or amend shall be accompanied by a fee of \$400 (rather than a fee not to exceed \$300). Provides that the fee for an application for a permit to oil lease road shall be \$150. Provides that the fees per well to be paid by the new owner for each transfer of well ownership shall be \$75 for the first 100 wells and \$50 for each subsequent well in excess of 100. Provides that the Department shall assess and collect annual well fees from each permittee in the amount of \$100 (instead of \$75) per well for the first 100 wells and a \$75 fee (instead of \$50) for each well in excess of 100 for which a permit is required under the Act.

House Floor Amendment No. 2

Replaces everything after the enacting clause with the provisions of the engrossed bill, and makes the following changes: Amends the Illinois Oil and Gas Act. Defines "temporary abandonment status". Provides that before engaging in the business of removing liquid oil field waste from an on-site collection point, the person shall apply for a permit with a fee of \$150 (instead of \$100). Provides that each application to transport oil field waste shall be accompanied by a biennial permit fee of \$150 (instead of \$100) for each vehicle sought to be licensed. General Legislative Updates

102nd GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

State Senator Rachelle Crowe was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate to serve as the United States Attorney for the Southern District of Illinois. Crowe is expected to officially resign her Senate Seat in the coming days.

Firefighter Eric Mattson, one of two candidates vying in the Democratic primary to replace Democratic Senator John Connor, was appointed to fill out the remainder of Connor's term. Mattson faces Rachel Ventura in the Democratic primary for the 43rd Legislative District. Connor, who is running for a judgeship, resigned effective April 30th to care for an immediate family member.

State Representative Kam Buckner announced he is running for Mayor of the City of Chicago, challenging first-term Mayor Lori Lightfoot. Lightfoot has not officially announced her re-election campaign but has hinted she will make the announcement soon. Buckner, who also chairs the House Black Caucus, is serving his second term in the Illinois House. Read more here.

ELECTION UPDATE:

Early voting for the June 28th primary election began Thursday, May 19th. The Chicago Tribune compiled a guide to the Illinois primary elections.

GOVERNOR'S HIGHLIGHTS:

Census Update: The Census Bureau released updated census numbers showing that it undercounted Illinois' population by 1.97% in the 2020 Census. The undercount was discovered in a follow-up survey the bureau conducted to measure the national tally's accuracy. The net effect of the undercount means Illinois' population actually grew by roughly 250,000 rather than shrinking by 18,000.

Social Equity Licenses: The Illinois Department of Agriculture issued the first pre-construction permits to social equity licensees established under the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, which clears the way for the businesses to begin construction. The Department issued permits to Galaxy Labs, Mint Cannabis, and Star Buds Illinois.

- Galaxy Labs, located in Richton Park, is 100% Latino and Black-owned
- Mint Cannabis, located in Forest Park, is 51% Latino-owned
- Star Buds Illinois, located in Rockford, is 66% Black-owned

Family Planning Clinics: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services granted the State of Illinois \$5.4 million to support and expand access to family planning services for low-income populations across Illinois. This federal grant, coupled with \$5.8 million in state GRF, equates to \$11.2 million which will be allocated to 29 delegate agencies that operate 98 family planning clinics throughout the state. The new HHS grant to the Illinois Department of Public Health will support access to Title X services under the Illinois Family Planning Program.

Nearly 100 family planning clinics throughout Illinois will benefit from \$11.2 million in funding that will span seven fiscal years, beginning July 1. The funding is a combination of monies from both the federal (\$5.4 million) and Illinois (\$5.8 million) governments. The funding to the Illinois Department of Public Health will help support and expand Title X services in Illinois. More info here.

Hospital Assessment: Governor Pritzker signed <u>HB 1950</u> which extends and expands the Hospital Assessment Program through 2026. The new law helps ensure cash-flow predictability for hospitals, tying greater funding to higher Medicaid use to protect safety net hospitals. Also, certain hospitals are re-classified, and some tax exemptions and waivers are enacted to help hospitals recover from the effects of COVID-19.

Ghost Guns: Governor Pritzker signed <u>HB 4383</u> which bans statewide the sale and possession of so-called 'ghost guns' – unserialized, privately made firearms often sold as a set of parts to be assembled at home.

Rural Healthcare: Two bills were signed concerning rural healthcare. <u>SB 3017</u> amends the Loan Repayment Assistance for Physicians Act to address the shortage of healthcare providers (especially obstetrical services) in rural committees. <u>SB1435</u> amends hospital licensing procedures to assist with health center mergers and increased healthcare coordination in rural districts.

New Laws: Below is list, in numerical order, of other bills signed this week:

- <u>HB 2991</u> Requires DVA to contract for a market research analysis of veterans' field services, subject to appropriations.
- <u>HB 3124</u> Requires the City of Chicago to maintain a rotational tow list.
- <u>HB 3465</u> Amends the Unified Code of Corrections to provide that each institution or facility of the Department of Corrections shall hire a re-entry specialist to assist with the re-entry of offenders into the community.
- <u>HB 4089</u> Requires a school district to provide a plant-based school lunch option to students.
- <u>HB 4284</u> Applies a tax at the rate of \$15 on a transfer of a motor vehicle from trust to a beneficiary that is not a surviving spouse upon the death of the grantor of the trust and the trust becomes irrevocable as is currently done in other transactions.
- <u>HB 4304</u> Creates the Foster Care Investigative Reports Commission to investigate all adverse reports, submitted by foster parents to DCFS, concerning the children placed in their care.
- <u>HB 4320</u> Amends the State Universities Article of the Illinois Pension Code to require an employer to make an additional contribution to the State Universities Retirement System for certain salary increases greater than 6%.
- <u>HB 4322</u> Amends the Residential Real Property Disclosure Act to make various updates and to provide greater clarity to the law.
- <u>HB 4324</u> Amends the Illinois Insurance Code to require insurance producer licensees to complete at least 24 hours of course study or participation in a professional insurance association.
- <u>HB 4333</u> Amends the Department of Central Management Services Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois by making changes in provisions concerning fidelity, surety, property, and casualty insurance, and modifies requirements concerning workers' compensation.
- <u>HB 4349</u> Requires health insurance companies that cover newborn infants with congenital defects to also cover the treatment of cranial facial anomalies.
- <u>HB 4362</u> Amends the Illinois Department of Revenue Sunshine Act by requiring the Department of Revenue to submit, rather than publish, to the Illinois Register an index of any informal rulings, opinions or letters issued by the Department of Revenue during the quarter and required to be made available.
- <u>HB 4366</u> Removes exemption of guardianship training that is required statewide except for counties with a population of more than 3,000,000.
- <u>HB 4369</u> Amends the Lead Poisoning Prevention Act to provide that the Department of Public Health or its delegate agency shall (rather than may) conduct a follow-up inspection of any dwelling unit for which a mitigation notice was issued.
- <u>HB 4388</u> Adds specified guidelines concerning continuing training on Alzheimer's disease and other dementias for Emergency Medical Services (EMT) personnel for license renewals.
- <u>HB 4461</u> Allows fire protection districts to recover costs of collecting past due amounts owed by a municipality after disconnection of fire protection district territory.
- <u>HB 4462</u> Amends the Illinois Credit Union Act to set forth provisions concerning credit unions that serve target markets.
- <u>HB 4493</u> Amends the Illinois Insurance Code to provide that no motor vehicle insurance policy shall be renewed, delivered, or issued in the State unless coverage is made available in the

- amount of the cash value of the motor vehicle or the limit for uninsured motor vehicle property damage, whichever is less.
- HB 4559 Amends the Unified Code of Corrections to provide that any person committed to the Department of Corrections may request a copy of the person's own master record file up to 4 times a year and the Department must provide records 5 days after receipt of request
- <u>HB 4580</u> Requires CPS to re-evaluate the enrollment at schools in the district to determine if there is a need to revise existing boundaries at least once every five years.
- HB 4595 Ensures that 340B covered entities are not discriminated against by pharmacy benefit
 managers, third party payers, and Medicaid managed care organizations during the contracting
 process.
- <u>HB 4667</u> Allows State and county correctional officers to carry firearms while off duty and into their retirement in accordance with a federal privilege afforded to law enforcement.
- HB 4680 Removes provisions requiring a veteran who has served as an active-duty member of
 the United States Armed Forces, the Illinois National Guard, or reserves of the United States
 Armed Forces to apply in person for a fishing license at a regional office of the Department of
 Natural Resources.
- <u>HB 4724</u> Amends the University Credit and Retail Sales Act. Provides that the governing body of a State institution of higher learning may permit the institution, or a retail store operated by the institution or on property held or leased for the use of the institution, to extend credit to students for the students' purchase of course materials.
- HB 4728 Amends the evidence-based funding provisions of the school code.
- <u>HB 4739</u> Amends Comptroller Act Makes changes to provisions concerning an annual comprehensive financial report as compiled and published by the Comptroller.
- <u>HB 4741</u> Amends the Unified Code of Corrections to require existing practice regarding the access to master record files.
- <u>HB 4797</u> Amends the Clinical Social Work and Social Work Practice Act to allow a person who is not a resident of Illinois to perform social work via telehealth in the state for a non-resident.
- <u>HB 4922</u> Amends the Nurse Practice Act by changing the date for issuing a certified nurse anesthetist license without a graduate degree before July 1, 2028 instead of July 2023.
- <u>HB 4924</u> Amends the Downstate Firefighter Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Removes language requiring the treasurer of the board to execute a bond to the municipality conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of the office and other conditions.
- <u>HB 4929</u> Amends the Illinois Optometric Practice Act of 1987 to allow optometrists to complete training to administer the COVID-19 vaccine.
- <u>HB 4986</u> Designates "Theatre in the Park" as the Official State Theatre of Illinois.
- <u>HB 4990</u> A change to Downstate Transit Operating Assistance Program that would adjust the 180-day deadline from the end of the State fiscal year to the end of the participant's fiscal year.
- <u>HB 4994</u> Requires school boards to annually file their threat assessment procedure and a list identifying members of the school district's threat assessment team or regional behavior threat assessment and intervention team.
- <u>HB 5003</u> Updates the school code to allow royalty payments to be deposited and expended from the Special Purpose Trust Fund within the Illinois State Board of Education.

- <u>HB 5018</u> Amends the Counties Code by creating the Cook County Treasurer fund.
- HB 5047 Allows a person designated as a health care agent to present an
 electronic device displaying an electronic copy of an executed form as proof of health care
 agency.
- <u>HB 5064</u> Requires that services contracted with DCFS, that involves transporting children or families, must comply with all federal and State laws.
- <u>HB 5078</u> Adds surviving stepchild, child through adoption, and half-brother or sister to the list of individuals who can receive a Gold Star license plate in Illinois.
- <u>HB 5093</u> Allows the Educational Labor Relations Board (ELRB) to serve documents via any method permitted in their rules.
- <u>HB 5127</u> Lengthens the amount of time that a school board may utilize to appoint their president and clerk.
- <u>HB 5142</u> Amends the Illinois Income Tax Act. Mandates that all individual income tax return forms shall contain an appropriate space in which the taxpayer may indicate that the Department of Revenue may share the taxpayer's income information with other State agencies in order to determine the taxpayer's eligibility for health insurance benefits.
- <u>HB 5175</u> Amends the Higher Education Student Assistance Act and the Public Community Colleges Act by requiring all veterans and active-duty members shall be considered an in-district resident for tuition purposes.
- <u>HB 5192</u> Amends the State Budget Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois by allowing the IL Budgeting for Results Commission to choose, by a majority vote, to forego the 2 in-person meetings required under this section and hold the annual public hearings virtually.
- <u>HB 5194</u> Creates the Banking Development District Act to help reduce the number of unbanked and underbanked individuals in Illinois.
- <u>HB 5225</u> Creates the Apprentice Assistance and Support Services Pilot Program Act subject to appropriation.
- <u>HB 5254</u> Amends the Illinois Insurance Code by requiring any individual or group policy of accident, health insurance, or managed care programs to provide coverage for hormone therapy treatment to treat menopause that has been induced by a hysterectomy.
- <u>HB 5265</u> Broadens access to education for students experiencing homelessness and poverty by
 ensuring charter school students have access to fee waivers, as is current practice at public
 schools
- <u>HB 5295</u> Amends the Chicago Police Article of the Illinois Pension Code by providing that a disability benefit paid by the Chicago Police pension fund shall be reduced by the amount of compensation the police officer receives from workers' compensation due to the police officer's secondary employment.
- <u>HB 5304</u> Changes vehicle registration fee for those eligible under the Senior Citizens and Persons with Disabilities Property Tax Relief Act and their spouses from \$24 to \$10.
- <u>HB 5316</u> Amends the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District Act by requiring the Board of Commissioners of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District to appoint from outside its own number an Inspector General or enter into an intergovernmental agreement with another unit of local government for the appointment of an Inspector General.

- <u>HB 5400</u> Allows vehicle decals to be purchased with proceeds going as grants from the fund to the Illinois Association of Future Farmers of America
- <u>HB 5418</u> Expands the Foster Children's Bill of Rights.

Subject: Recommendation for FY23 Property and Casualty Insurance Renewal

RECOMMENDATION: Authorize the General Manager to renew property and casualty insurance effective July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.

BACKGROUND: Connect is renewing the property and casualty insurance from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023. This renewal covers the following insurance coverage: workers' compensation, property, general liability, automotive liability, automotive comprehensive, umbrella liability, directors and officers liability and employment practices liability, fiduciary, cyber liability, and crime insurance.

DISCUSSION: Connect will be switching the workers' compensation provider from United Heartland to Travelers. Connect will save \$72,289 in FY23 by switching to Travelers. Even with the switch to Travelers, Connect will receive a \$26,599.00 increase (from \$236,505 FY22 to \$263,104 FY23) in premium for the workers' compensation insurance renewal. The increase is due to an increased Experience Mod and an increase in salaries for FY23.

Connect will also receive an increase in the Property and Casualty Insurance renewal. The total increase is \$19,566 (from \$398,209 FY22 to \$417,775 FY23). The majority of this premium increase (\$13,855) is from the automotive liability and comprehensive coverage. This increase is due to the new electric buses we purchased and an overall increase in rates in the industry.

Even though this is a significant increase, we feel this is a reasonable renewal. We will be working with Assurance to help with programs to mitigate our claims in the future.

FINANCIAL IMPACT: The total cost for this renewal \$680,879, a \$46,165 (7.3%) increase over FY22, will come from the FY23 Operating Budget.

RE: FY 2023 Heath Insurance Renewal

RECOMMENDATION: That the contract with Connect Transit's current healthcare insurance provider, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Illinois (BCBS), be approved for a contract term of July 1, 2022 – June 30, 2023.

BACKGROUND: The current health insurance policy with BCBS is set to renew July 1, 2022. Employees will maintain the choice of three (3) plans: MPP83436, MPP938C, or MPEO1Z0720.

- 1. **MPP83436:** This plan has a \$1,000 individual deductible and a \$3,000 family deductible.
 - a. CHANGES: No changes made to this plan.
- 2. **MPP9383C:** This plan has a \$1,500 individual deductible and a \$4,500 family deductible.
 - a. **CHANGES:** No changes made to this plan.
- 3. **MPEQ1Z0720:** This plan is a high deductible HSA. This plan offers a \$2,800 individual and a \$5,600 family deductible.
 - a. **CHANGES:** No changes made to this plan.

Financial Impact: The total cost increase will be 9.5% from the 2021 – 2022 renewal. This renewal is after a two-year, fixed fee contract with no increase, making the average increase over the past 2-years only 4.75%.

There will be no increase to our Life/AD&D or FMLA benefits from the 2021 – 2022 renewal.

There will be no increase in our Dental, Vision & LTD premium cost and a 27.4% INCREASE in the Short-Term Disability (STD) premium. This STD increase is due to usage from COVID claims.

Note: Our vision insurance has a 4 year rate lock until 7/1/2026.

Subject: Recommendation of FY23 Operating and Capital Budget

RECOMMENDATION: That the FY23 Operating and Capital Budget be adopted.

BACKGROUND: Our Draft FY23 Budget was presented for your review and consideration at the Connect Transit Board of Trustees April meeting, and the final budget will be presented at the Connect Transit Board of Trustees' May meeting and will be posted on our website for public review at a later date.

The FY23 budget includes 118,974 revenue hours for fixed route service (up 10.1% from FY22) and 36,334 revenue hours for Connect Mobility (up 7% from FY22).

This budget includes new services to West Bloomington-Normal beginning in the first quarter of FY23, and new demand responsive Microtransit service beginning in fourth quarter of FY23.

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
